Census 2020

How do you divide \$675 billion in federal tax dollars fairly across the nation? You start with an accurate census count of every person living in the United States.

One of the most important things you can do for Minnesota and for Roseville, is to complete the 2020 Census. Every household will receive an invitation to complete the census in mid-March. The letter will include a web address, a unique Census ID Code and a toll-free telephone number to call for help completing the census.

Completing the census is required by law. Every household is requested to complete the census by April 1. If you do not complete the census by April 8, your household will receive a reminder letter and paper questionnaire. If the paper questionnaire is not completed by the end of April, a census worker will visit your home.

Completing the census online is efficient and secure. Information is encrypted and once data is received it is no longer stored online.

The information that is collected will be used to make funding decisions for education, health care, transportation, infrastructure and more. It will also help determine the number seats Minnesota will have in Congress.

If you don't have access to a computer, Questionnaire Assistance Centers (QAC) have been set up across the state. Computers will be available for anyone to complete the census. Staff and trained volunteers will be available to offer assistance. The Ramsey County Library in Roseville is a QAC.

Know the Code Hiring a Building Contractor

When building a new home or remodeling your current home, finding the right building contractor is one of the most important decisions you will make.

Ensuring that your home is built or remodeled correctly is a collaborative effort between the homeowner, builder, the city and the state. The Minnesota Department of Labor and Industry provides a consumer guide for anyone planning such a project. It describes rules for licensing and performance of contractors, recommends steps to help ensure a satisfactory job and explains the recourse consumers have when results are less than satisfactory.

Roseville's Permits and Inspections Division work with residents to issue appropriate permits and verify the licensure status of contractors. Staff inspects the work to ensure that building projects are done properly.

The city cannot make recommendations on builders or contractors. Homeowners are encouraged to check references and speak with the Lending Center at Center for Energy and Environment (CEE). CEE provides free,

comprehensive housing services to homeowners, including:

- Providing information and assistance in applying for home loan financing, including low interest loans
- Identifying home improvement and repair projects, and providing advice on construction, building codes and permits
- Conducting site visits and written scope of work
- Reviewing contractor bids, proposals and estimates
- Providing low-interest financing for qualified home improvement projects

Hybrid Vehicle

Roseville Public Works continues to up its commitment to sustainability. The department recently acquired its first hybrid vehicle. The 2019 Mitsubishi Outlander PHEV (plug-in hybrid electric vehicle) is being used by the Utility Superintendent.

The vehicle can be recharged by plugging it into an external source of electric power, as well as by its on-board engine and generator. It primarily performs as a pure electric vehicle unless the battery gets low or extra power is needed, then its on-board engine kicks in. It has fuel tank capacity of 11 gallons and gets an overall combined range of about 300 miles, depending on driving conditions.

2020 Legislative Priorities

In January, the Roseville City Council approved its legislative priorities for the 2020 legislative session. Legislative priorities are items and issues that the City of Roseville directly supports, and will engage the Minnesota Legislature to pass and implement.

Topping the list of highest priority items is financial support through the state's 2020 bonding bill for \$5 million in capital improvements for the Guidant John Rose Minnesota OVAL and support facilities.

Advocating to allow cities to license hotels is an issue Roseville has supported for several years and was also approved as a high-priority item by the Council. Staff has begun investigating available options for a potential municipal hotel/motel licensing program similar to the city's current licensing program for multi-family rental properties.

The two remaining high-priority items include advocating for Cedarholm Community Building to obtain an on-sale intoxicating liquor license and, secondly to allow taprooms and cocktail rooms on the same premises.

Other priorities supported by the City Council include statewide licensing of massage therapists, increase in transportation funding, allowing municipalities to require sprinkler systems in multi-family rental units, improving absentee balloting and continuing to fund the DEED Redevelopment Grant Program and the Demolition Loan Program, among other items. OVAL Project among Governor's Bonding Priorities

The City of Roseville's \$5 million bonding request on behalf of the Guidant John Rose Minnesota OVAL cleared an important hurdle in January when the project was included among Governor Tim Walz's 2020 Capital Budget Bonding Recommendations. Included in the funding request is replacement of much of the refrigeration plant and brine pumping system and significant repairs to the concrete refrigeration rink.

Since its construction, the state's investment in the OVAL has allowed skaters from around the state, country, and world to use, train, and compete at a world-class level right here in Minnesota. Boasting the largest continuous outdoor sheet of refrigerated ice in North America at 110,000 sq. ft., the OVAL is both a training and competition center for amateur and professional athletes as well as a statewide recreational destination.

City Utility Bill Payment Options and Managing Your Account

City of Roseville utility bills include charges for water, sanitary sewer, storm sewer and recycling. Bills are mailed quarterly to residents and businesses, and customers can pay their bill through a number of options.

Auto Pay Program

The most convenient way to pay your bill is through the city's Auto Pay Program. With this option, you can pay your utility bill through your checking or savings account. No more checks to write or stamps to buy. The program is free and only requires a one-time setup.

Pay Online

You can also pay your bill online using your Visa or MasterCard credit or debit card. With this option, you can set up a one-time payment or have your bill paid on a recurring basis each time it is due. You must create an online profile including an email address and password before using this service.

If you use this option, you must update your credit card information when a new card is issued. For security reasons, the city cannot accept credit or debit card payments over the phone or by mail, nor can we make changes to online profiles or card information.

Pay by Mail/Walk-in

Utility customers can also pay by check through the mail or by dropping payments in the secure drop box located in the parking lot near the entrance to City Hall. If mailing your payment, please follow the mail-in instructions located on your bill. Payments must be received on or before the due date listed on the bill to avoid a 10% late fee.

Managing Your Account

In addition to paying your bill online, you can manage your account once you set up an online profile. After you sign up, you will have access to historical billing information, water usage and more. You'll also be able to receive e-mail notifications when your bill is ready for viewing.

Roseville Fire: 2010 and Beyond

The City of Roseville is celebrating 75 years of fire service to the community. Over the past several issues of the newsletter, we highlighted the history and growth of the Roseville Fire Department, the people, the fires and the sacrifices that have made the department what it is today.

In the 2010s the Roseville Fire Department changed from a part-time to a primarily full-time department. With the annual emergency call volume approaching 5,000, the complexity of serving a community with a daytime population of more than 80,000 and the difficulty of recruiting and retaining part-time firefighters, it was time for a new model.

As the department looked to the future, one thing was clear, the department needed to address its aging, outdated buildings. Following a year-long effort that included community input, a taskforce reviewed the current buildings and locations. The task force recommended consolidating into one state-of-the-art fire station on the City call campus. The new building opened in the fall of 2013.

In 2014, the Fire Department began its transition from part-time staffing/response to full-time and six full-time firefighters were hired. During the next five years the department added full-time staffing to offset the reduction in part-time firefighters. Today, the department has 14 part-time firefighters and 20 full-time firefighters.

The City of Roseville continues to grow at record pace, adding significant development and residents. Public safety (Police and Fire) needs to be prepared to meet the next generation of challenges. The future is busy and full of opportunities as the department responded to more than 5,500 emergencies in 2019, making it one of the busiest suburban departments in the metro area. The department continues to plan to meet the needs of the community while keeping residents and firefighters safe. They look forward to the challenges that lay ahead.



Unwanted Solicitations

Springtime often kicks off the home improvement season, but that can also mean unscrupulous salespeople pressuring homeowners to buy unnecessary products or services. Some solicitors target senior citizens and try to scare them into making immediate decisions.

Each spring the city gets complaints about salespeople pressuring residents to trim trees, sign up for lawn services, get a roof or chimney repaired, reseal the driveway or other home repairs that may not be needed. They'll exaggerate the problem or imply that the city will come after them if repairs are not made immediately.

Solicitation in Roseville is legal between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. If residents do not want solicitors coming to their door, they can post a "No Peddlers or Solicitors" sign. If a sign is posted and someone comes to the door, residents can call the police at 651-767-0640. If you feel threatened, call 9-1-1.

A few reminders before hiring someone:

- Do not be pressured into making an immediate decision about purchasing a product or service.
- Be wary of a person who happens to be in the neighborhood and looking for a side job.
- Do not work with a contractor who requires full or substantial pre-payment for work.
- Do not pay in full until work is completed to your satisfaction.
- Get a signed contract with full details of scope of work and costs.
- Ask friends or neighbors for recommendations for companies or individuals.
- Check references, and check with the Better Business Bureau to see if complaints have been filed against the person or company.

Fall cleanup and leaf raking generally grab all the headlines. But, there's plenty to do around your yard once the snow melts.

The city asks residents to help protect our local bodies of water while doing spring yard work by keeping leaves, trimmings, grass clippings and other yard waste out of the street.

Once the rain starts falling, any organic material on the street will enter our storm drain system and flow directly into the watershed. Anything other than rainwater going through storm drains has the potential to degrade the quality of our lakes, streams and wetlands.

Make a habit of bagging leaves, trimmings and unwanted grass clippings. Better still, let the grass clippings go back on your lawn as a free and natural fertilizer. If you still need to fertilize, please select a phosphorus-free fertilizer and apply to grass only, taking care to keep it away from sidewalks, driveways and roads.

Clean Sweep

Every spring and fall, Roseville's streets get a clean sweep. As part of the city's efforts to prevent stormwater pollution, the Streets Department sweeps every Roseville street in an effort to minimize the amount of dirt, sand and debris entering our local bodies of water.

Crews start with environmentally sensitive areas, high usage streets and center medians. Most sweeping is completed between 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

Happy Hydrants

Did you know that the city's Public Works Department flushes all 1,750 public fire hydrants in Roseville each year? Flushing ensures that hydrants are working properly and ready for use in the event of an emergency. Over time, mineral deposits accumulate in the water mains that feed the hydrants. Hydrant flushing removes these deposits from the hydrant system.

Occasionally, tap water may be discolored for a short period near a recently flushed hydrant. If this occurs, let the water run until it is clear. Although the discolored water may have a mineral taste, it is safe to drink.


Hydrants are flushed in the spring after the city sweeps the streets of sand and debris that has accumulated over the winter months.

Roseville uses single-sort recycling. Drop recyclables, including cardboard boxes, mail, newspapers and magazines, plastic containers (#1, #2 and #5), glass bottles and jars, aluminum and metal cans, beverage cartons and juice boxes in your recycling cart. Have it at the curb by 7:00 a.m. on your recycling day. Do not place recyclables in plastic bags. Visit PlasticFilmRecycling.org to find a drop-off location near you for plastic bags.

Recycling is picked up every other week on the same day as your trash. Call Eureka Recycling at 612-NO-WASTE (612-669-2783) with recycling questions or to report a missed pick-up. Interpreters are available to respond to inquiries in Hmong, Karen, Somali and Spanish in addition to English. Call 612-669-2783, ext. 1. for assistance.

Public Works Projects on tap for 2020

As winter winds down, Minnesota's fifth season, construction season, is about to heat up. Roseville's Public Works Department will again be active around town in 2020. There are 5.29 miles of new mill and overlay paving projects as part of the city's Pavement Management Program. Nearly a mile of new pathway segments will be completed, including the pathway on Walnut St. connecting Diagonal Trail to County Road C and the County Road C trail.

Close to a mile of watermain replacements is also on the agenda, which will impact Cleveland Ave. (County Road C2 to County Road D), Lexington Ave. (County Road C to Woodhill) and Fernwood St. (Larpenteur to Rose Vista Ct.).

Two lift stations, Fernwood and Galtier, will receive rehabilitation work, including replacing pumps, valves, electrical equipment, and generators. A new protective coating will be applied to the wet-well.


What is a Lift Station?

Wastewater lift stations are facilities designed to move wastewater from lower to higher elevations. Key elements of lift stations include a wastewater receiving well or wet-well, pumps and piping with associated valves, motors, a power supply system, an equipment control and alarm system and a ventilation system.



Other Projects in Roseville

- Year two of MnDOT's three-year 35W MnPASS Project between County Road C in Roseville and Lino Lakes will ramp up in early spring and bring heavy congestion to the interstate. The focus of work will be the northbound lanes.
- MnDOT will replace signal lights and improve curb ramps at Snelling Ave. and County Road C2 and at Snelling Ave. and Roselawn Ave.
- Ramsey County will complete reconstructing County Road C between Highway 88 in St Anthony and Long Lake Rd. in Roseville. The county will also resurface Lexington Ave. from Highway 36 to County Road C2.

Re-Cycle will collect bicycles to be stripped for parts or restored and returned to the road. Carpet and pads are reclaimed for a variety of products including new carpet and carpet pads, plastic resin, acoustic matting, sorbent material and other uses.

Components from electronics such as TVs, computers, monitors, VCRs or stereos are reclaimed. Computer hard drives are scrubbed before recycling.

Hazardous items such as fluorescent bulbs, lawn chemicals and pesticides are not accepted at Clean Up Day. Please take those items to a free Ramsey County Household Hazardous Waste Site. Visit RamseyRecycles.com or call 651-633-EASY (3279) for locations and other information.

If you have items that are in good shape, consider giving them to friends or relatives or donating to a charity such as Bridging or Goodwill rather than putting in the trash.

Responding to Crises

Police work isn't just writing speeding tickets or chasing the bad guys. Every day, officers receive calls to check on the welfare of another - a person is threatening suicide or has made an attempt, or someone has overdosed on drugs or alcohol, or a person is in a mental health crisis. On average officers respond to four crisis calls in any given day.

Roseville police officers receive extensive, on-going training about how to respond to a crisis or diffuse a volatile situation, but they are not trained mental health professionals.

In 2019, Roseville police partnered with four neighboring police departments and Northeast Youth and Family Services to hire a community mental health caseworker. The caseworker follows up after a mental health-related call and provides resources and assistance to improve outcomes for a person or family in crisis.

Although we've had less than a year of experience, in Roseville the caseworker reports that 87 percent of persons referred for case management services had not had another interaction with the police. Police officers are able to focus resources on other enforcement and prevention efforts.

McGough is a family-owned business that opened its doors in Roseville in 1956. It started as a masonry company and expanded to be a general contractor and construction management firm with branch offices in Iowa, North Dakota, Texas and Greater Minnesota.

In 2016, the company decided it was time to expand its headquarters to accommodate the company's rapid growth and to consolidate its metro area offices into one location. Staff began a search for a building to accommodate 250 employees. They looked in Roseville and then expanded to search in neighboring communities when they did not find what they wanted. Then, McGough President Tom McGough, Jr. took a second look at an aging trucking terminal located within eyesight of its main office.

The building was old and shabby and needed major renovations. McGough is known for its historical restorations and renovations, so the truck terminal provided an opportunity and a challenge to the company. By refurbishing the building, McGough could highlight the capabilities and workmanship for which the company is known.

Two building wings were demolished and a two-story entryway that featured a cured, poured-in-place concrete staircase and brick cladding exterior was added. The terminal's bow truss area was structurally reinforced and now houses an open office space for its employees. McGough was able to minimize the impact of relocating its headquarters and allowed the company to use its own expertise in the areas of reuse, restoration and sustainability.

McGough is a long-time Roseville supporter, co-sponsoring the annual Rose Parade. McGough is a corporate sponsor of the Roseville Area School Foundation, supporting a variety of school activities including field trips for the girls' high school woodworking class to tour McGough's Bloomington Central Station project and the Carpenter's Training Center in St. Paul.

This year, McGough is a sponsor of the Visit Roseville - Roseville in Bloom art event taking place this summer.
