Item Description: Adopt an Ordinance relating to ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT to Sign

Regulation regarding Political Signs.

1.0 REQUESTED ACTION

Amend Section 1010.03B10 regarding political signs to be consistent with recent changes in date of the primary election.

2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Minnesota has traditionally held the primary for statewide offices in September, but recent federal changes require states to begin mailing absentee ballots 45 days before an election. This will help ensure that military and overseas voters have enough time to return their absentee ballots to be counted in an election.
- 2.2 Governor Pawlenty signed into law a provision that changes the date of the primary election to the second Tuesday of August. Currently Roseville's City Code sets the date for the primary election to the first Tuesday after the second Monday in September.
- 2.3 Roseville's current sign ordinance restricts placing political signs until August 1, in years with state general elections. Under the current ordinance provision, candidates and political campaigns would have seven to 13 days to post signs before the new primary election date.

3.0 PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT 1010.03: PERMITS:

- 10. Political signs to the extent that the following criteria are met:
 - a. In years when a state general election is held, political signs may be posted from August 1 46 days before the primary election until 10 days following the state general election. Any such signs must be removed by those responsible for their being posted.

4.0 STAFF COMMENTS

The objective of the proposed TEXT AMENDMENT would be to:

- **a.** Bring the City Code into compliance with recently passed legislation changing the election date to August.
- **b.** Allow political campaigns to post campaign signs 46 days before a primary election.

5.0 STAFF RECOMMENDATION

The Planning Division recommends approval; of the Text Amendment to Section 1010.03B10 to create language necessary to be consistent with recent legislative changes.

6.0 PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION

On Wednesday, May 5, 2010, the Roseville Planning Division held the duly noticed public hearing regarding the change in date for placement of political signs. No members of the community were present to address the Planning Commission and Commissioners do not have any questions of the Planning Staff. The Commission voted (6-0) to recommend approval of the ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT change

FULHAM POND INLET REPAIR

This project is the repair of two storm sewer inlets. One located on the east side of Fulham pond directly adjacent to 2328 Terminal Road. The second is located to the east of the Ramsey County Open Space parking lot at 481 Larpenteur Avenue. The work consists of storm sewer manhole construction, pipe installation, and restoration.

This project is the elimination of a lift station and the construction of a gravity line into the City of Lauderdale to allow conveyance of the Paper Calmenson wastewater to the Metropolitan Council's trunk system via the Lauderdale sanitary sewer system. The work in this project includes bituminous removal, sanitary sewer construction, sanitary sewer directional boring, sewer structure repair, removal of the existing lift station and grading and restoration.

The work for this contract was finished in March 2010, and the contractor has requested final payment.

FINANCIAL IMPACTS

The final contract amount, \$389,011.42, is \$43,188.20 more than the awarded amount of \$343,930.00. This represents an increase in the contract of 12.5%. The cost increases are a result of a change in the approach for constructing the TH280 Sanitary Sewer, and the repair of one additional storm sewer inlet. The decisions regarding these changes needed to be made while the work was being completed, not allowing for the processing of a these supplemental

agreements prior to the execution of the work. A summary of the Supplemental agreements are listed below:

Supplemental Agreement #1	This project was initially proposed to be completed using trenchless technology. However, during the execution of the sanitary sewer pipe boring, an obstruction required the contractor to abandon the trenchless approach.	\$32,584.72

BACKGROUND:

2 On March 24, 2008, the City Council authorized a study of the storm water hydrology of the

3 Walsh Lake subwatershed located in the neighborhood southeast of Midland Hills Golf Course

4 ("Rosewood Neighborhood") due to neighborhood concerns about localized street flooding and

damage to property. This area includes the following streets: Midland Hills Road, Draper

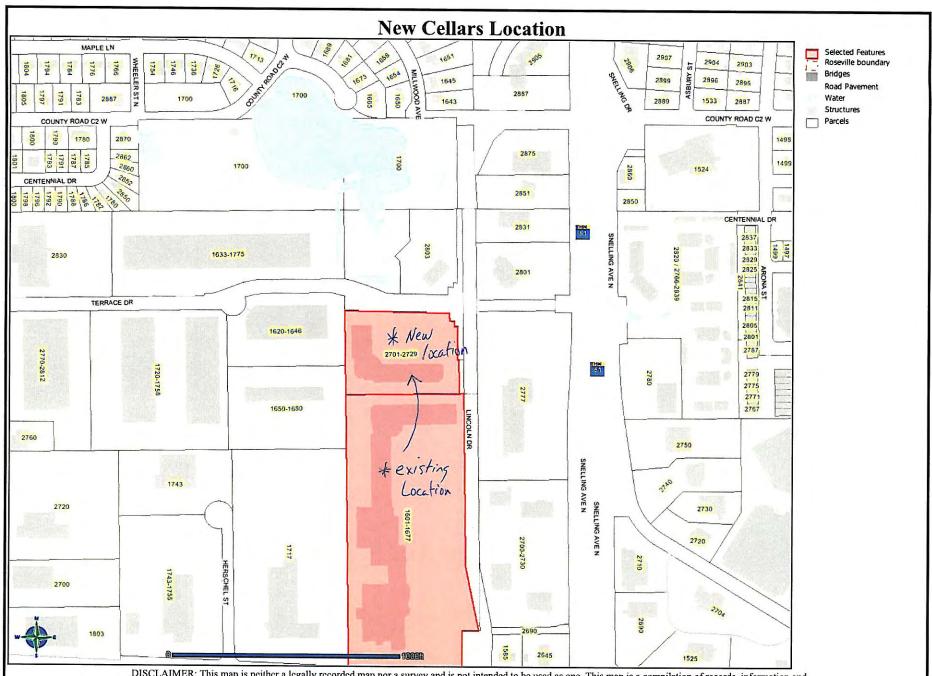

owners that in order to take these streets over, they would need to be brought to City standards

- 8 To better understand the costs and potential impacts for both the City and the Homeowners as a

investigation would take the form of a Feasibility Report. This Feasibility Report would include

Thank you for visiting with me recently to discuss Ferriswood Condominium's and Ferriswood II Condominium's request that the private street portion of Ferris Lane be dedicated and accepted by the City of Roseville (the "City") as a public street and that after acceptance it improved as a public improvement project. Our firm has been requested to assist the respective Associations in proceeding through and accomplishing this process.

That portion of Ferris Lane extending north of its intersection with Gluek Lane, and including the circular loop at the northern end thereof, is a common element private street (herein the "Private Street") of Ferriswood Condominium and is therefore owned in undivided percentage interests by the owners/members of Ferriswood Condominium. The Private Street is subject to a permanent non-exclusive easement for ingress and egress benefitting the owners and members of Ferriswood II Condominium. We understand the Private Street area is also subject to a Utilities Easement for sewer and water service benefitting both Ferriswood Condominium and Ferriswood II Condominium and assume this is for City sewer and water lines. The Private Street is in need of significant repair and needs to be improved.

The Ferriswood Condominium and the Ferriswood II Condominium, by their respective Boards of Directors, request the City accept a grant of an easement by the Ferriswood Condominium Association, at no cost to the City, over the Private Street area,

with boundaries acceptable to the City, for public right-of-way purposes and that the City undertake improvement of the Private Street in accordance with City standards as a public improvement project to be paid by special assessment (the "Project").

To get underway with the Project, we understand the City will undertake the preparation of a Feasibility Report, estimated by the City to cost approximately \$6,556.64, provided Ferriswood Condominium and Ferriswood II Condominium agree to reimburse the City for its costs incurred in preparing the Report. This Feasibility Report is to include a comprehensive review of the Project scope, preliminary cost estimates, proposed funding scenarios, review of potential land use actions needed, a schedule, identification of the needed right-of-way, a construction survey to determine the existing conditions as a basis for developing preliminary plans, preparation of the actual preliminary plans for the proposed pavement rehabilitation project, staff time to meet with Association representatives regarding the Project, and City attorney time to prepare and review the necessary agreements, including a street transfer agreement, proposed form of petition and waiver for a public improvement project and a public right-of-way easement agreement.

We are informed the respective Boards for Ferriswood Condominium and Ferriswood II Condominium have approved reimbursement of 60% and 40% respectively of the City's actual costs incurred for the Feasibility Report based on the City's preliminary estimate of \$6,556.64.

If the findings of the Feasibility Report are acceptable to the City, Ferriswood Condominium and Ferriswood II Condominium and each is agreeable to continue with the Project, we anticipate the parties will want to enter into an agreement to proceed as follows:

- 1. **Ferriswood Condominium and Ferriswood II Condominium** will obtain the requisite homeowner approval for granting an easement over the Ferriswood Condominium common element property for public right-of-way. While the Bylaws of Ferriswood Condominium authorize its Board to grant an easement through its common element property for a public right-of-way if approved by 50% of the homeowners, we believe this may be superseded by the statutory requirement under Minnesota Statutes Section 515B.3-112 requiring approval by 67% of the homeowners. The existing access easement over the Ferriswood Condominium common element property for the benefit of Ferriswood II Condominium is non-exclusive and therefore Ferriswood Condominium can grant a further easement for public right-of-way over its common element property but we propose that consent to the grant of a public right-of-way easement be obtained from at 67% of the Ferriswood II Condominium owners also.
- 2. The **City, Ferriswood Condominium** and **Ferriswood II Condominium** will enter into a Street Transfer Agreement committing:

- a. **Ferriswood Condominium** to grant an easement, and Ferriswood II Condominium to consent thereto, to the City, without cost to the City, for purposes of public right-of-way.
- b. The **City** will accept the easement.
- c. The appropriate officers of Ferriswood Condominium Association and the Ferriswood II Condominium Association (not individual homeowners) will execute a Petition and Waiver Agreement in form acceptable to the City requesting improvement of the street as a public improvement project with assessment of the entire cost, 60% to Ferriswood Condominium Association and 40% to Ferriswood II Condominium Association (not the individual homeowners).
- d. The City will, upon acceptance of the Petition and Waiver by the Ferriswood Condominium and Ferriswood II Condominium Associations, commence the public improvement process including approval of special assessments for the cost against Ferriswood Condominium Association (60% of the cost) and Ferriswood II Condominium Association (40% of the cost) payable together with interest thereon over an agreed upon installment period not to exceed 15 years. We understand this requires City Council approval, but that the City Council can approve the matter without a public hearing based on the Petition and Waiver provided by the Associations.
- e. The **City** agrees that after the public improvement project is completed it will continue to maintain, repair and replace the public right-of-way at the same frequency and level as is done for similar public improvements in the City.

The matters set forth in this letter are not intended to be a proposal or demand, but are instead offered as a roadmap of what we hope to discuss and evaluate during our meeting on Friday. We look forward to our meeting with you on Friday.

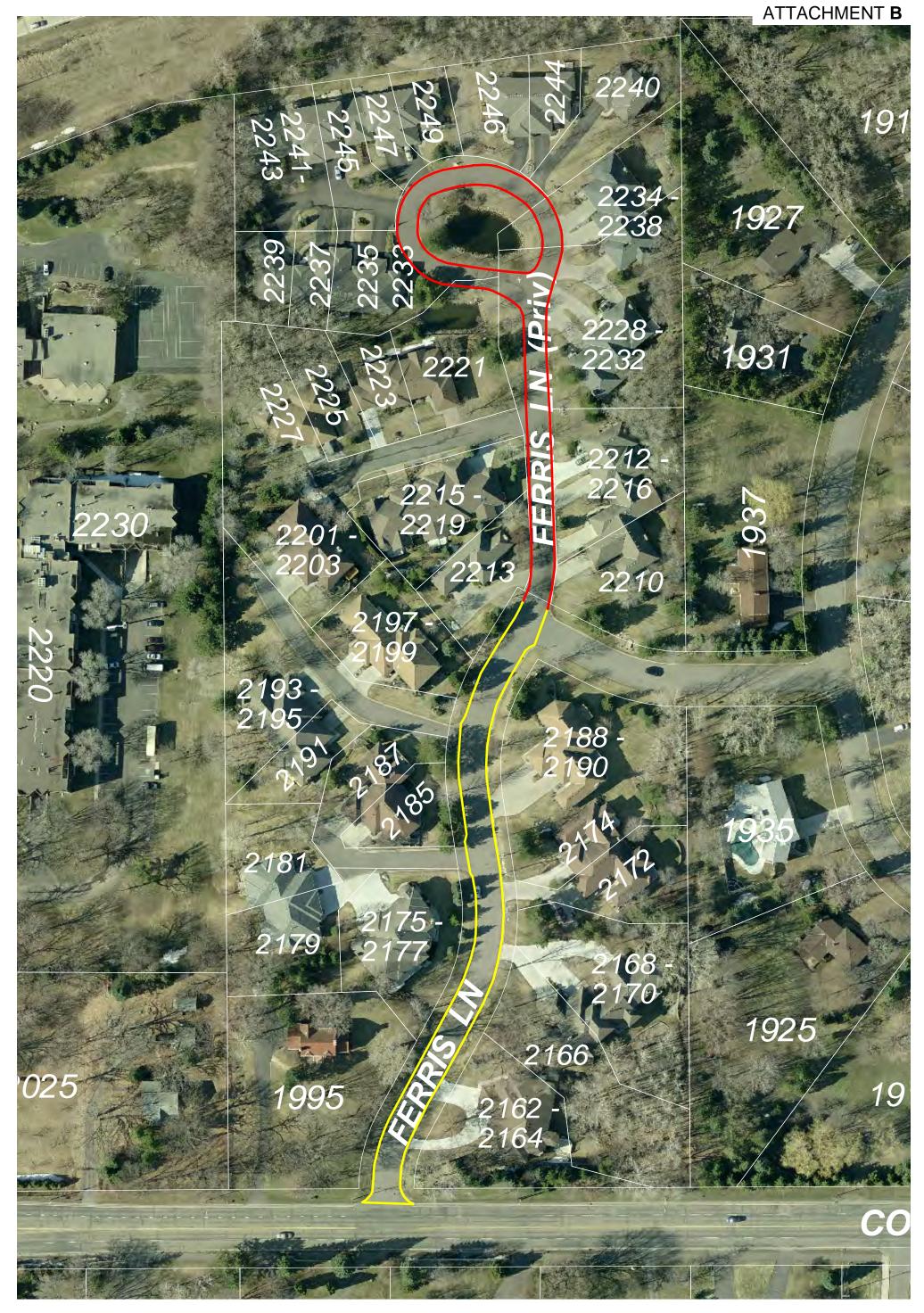

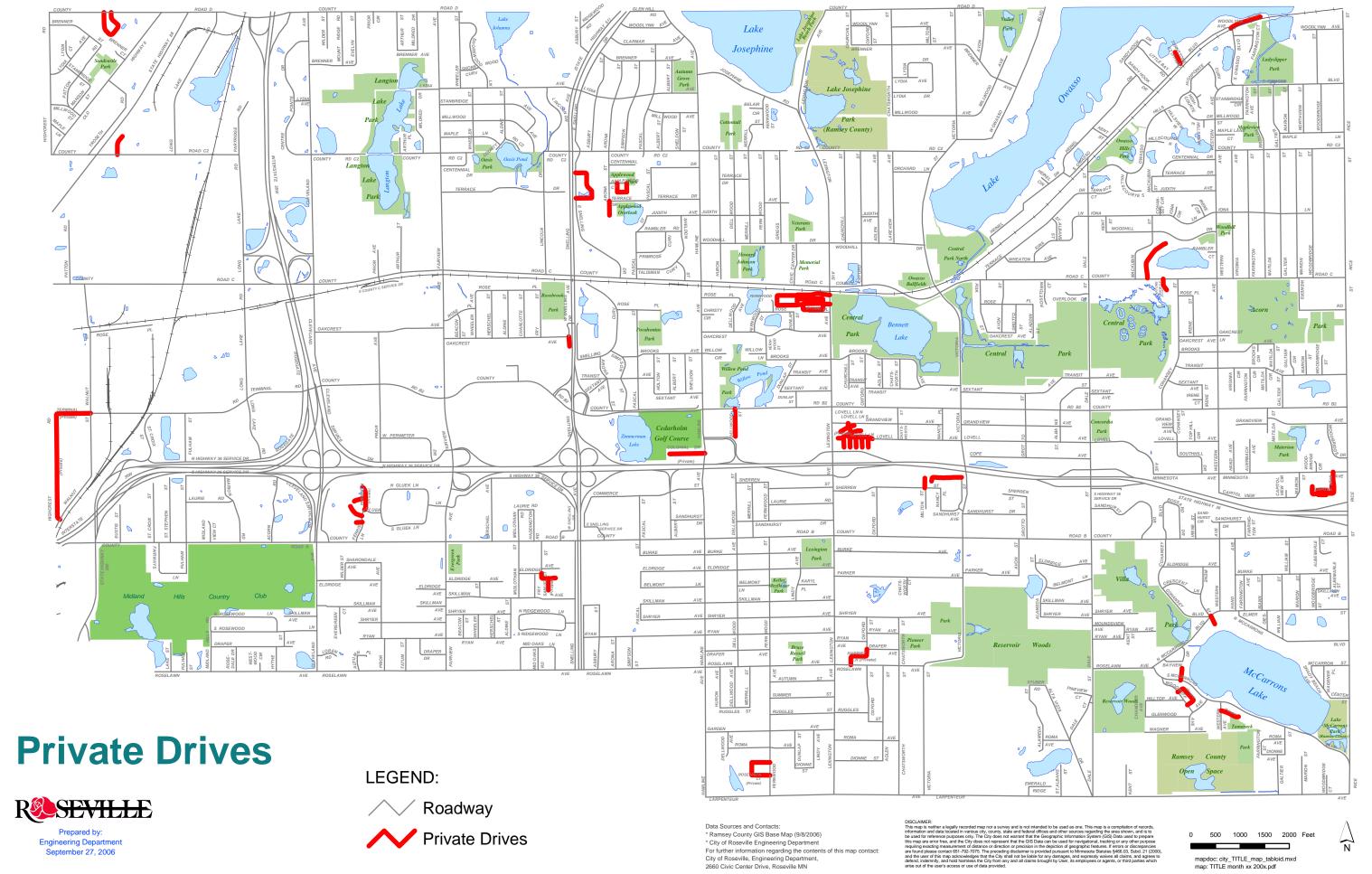

Adopt a Resolution approving a COMPREHENSIVE PLAN TEXT AMENDMENT to include Institutional land uses among the uses allowed in areas guided for Regional, Community, and Neighborhood Business land uses

1.0 BACKGROUND

1

- During the current process of reviewing a proposed zoning text amendment which would permit churches in areas designated as Regional Business areas by the Comprehensive Plan, both the Planning Commission and the City Council indicated support for the proposed use. Because the Comprehensive Plan was determined to exclude Institutional uses (e.g., religious institutions, schools, etc.) from Regional Business areas, however, the City Council directed Planning Division staff to initiate the process of amending the text of Comprehensive Plan to allow institutional land uses in certain commercial areas.
- 1.2 Although the original ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT application hasn't yet been formally 9 withdrawn, a representative of the church has indicated that the subject property was no 10 11 longer available, so an amendment to the existing zoning text is no longer necessary, but approval of the COMPREHENSIVE PLAN TEXT AMENDMENT will enable the updated zoning 12 code to allow and regulate the uses in commercial areas once the new zoning code is in 13 place. If the ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT application is not withdrawn by the applicant, 14 Planning Division staff will recommend denial of the request at the May 24th City 15 Council meeting in order to ensure that action is taken before the June 5, 2010 deadline. 16
- 17 1.3 Approval of a recommended amendment to the Comprehensive Plan requires adoption of a City Council resolution by a supermajority vote of 4/5^{ths} or greater.
- On April 7, 2010, the Planning Commission discussed the proposed COMPREHENSIVE
 PLAN TEXT AMENDMENT and determined that it should be treated as a major amendment
 pursuant to §201.07. This determination necessitates a public hearing for the proposed
 amendment, which can only be recommended for approval by resolution of the Planning
 Commission through a supermajority vote of 5/7 or greater.
- 1.5 The required open house meeting about the proposed Comprehensive Plan Text 24 AMENDMENT was held in City Hall Council Chambers on Wednesday, April 21, 2010 25 from 6:00 p.m.-8:00 p.m. One member of the public came into the Council Chambers at 26 27 7:00 p.m. because he had seen the signs posted in the hallway, but he was uninterested in the topic of the open house meeting; and one member of the project team related to the 28 original application for a ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT arrived at 8:00 p.m. to inquire about 29 how the meeting went. Planning Division staff has received no communication about the 30 proposed Comprehensive Plan text amendment from the public. 31

2.0 STAFF COMMENTS

32

- Modern institutional uses like schools and places of worship generate considerably more traffic than their historical counterparts whose students and members came largely from the surrounding neighborhoods. Although the additional traffic created by the general expansion of institutions' "service areas" and broadened scope of services might not rise to the level of some of the other commercial uses anticipated in the Comprehensive Plan's various "business" land use categories, this traffic can create significant impacts in the residential neighborhoods where churches and schools are traditionally found.
- The proposed amendment is included with this staff report as Attachment A; words that are to be added to the descriptions of the business land use designation are formatted in **bold** lettering, and deletions are formatted with strikethrough lettering. The core of the amendment is the insertion of references to include institutional land uses in the affected land use categories, and any other editing is meant to recover proper syntax and grammar.
- This sort of amendment recognizes that institutional uses are allowed in the designated areas, provided that they are of the pertinent "regional," "community," or "neighborhood" scale. Whether uses allowed by a Comprehensive Plan land use designation are *permitted* or *conditional* uses is a determination to be made during the ongoing zoning code update process, and is not germane to the approval or denial of the proposed amendment.

3.0 PUBLIC HEARING

The duly-noticed public hearing for the COMPREHENSIVE PLAN TEXT AMENDMENT was held by the Planning Commission on May 5, 2010. No public comment was offered before or during the public hearing. After discussing the proposed amendment, the Planning Commission unanimously (6-0) adopted a resolution recommending the approval of the amendment.

4.0 STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Based on the comments and findings in Sections 1-3 of this report, Planning Division staff concurs with the recommendation of the Planning Commission to approve the proposed COMPREHENSIVE PLAN TEXT AMENDMENT.

5.0 SUGGESTED ACTION

Adopt a resolution recommending approval of the proposed COMPREHENSIVE PLAN TEXT AMENDMENT to include institutional uses among the land uses allowed in Regional Business, Community Business, and Neighborhood Business land use categories of the Comprehensive Plan, based on the comments and findings of Sections 1-3 and the recommendation in Section 4 of this report.

Plan land use designations

Community Mixed Use (CMU)

Community Mixed Use areas are intended to contain a mix of complementary uses that may include housing, office, civic, commercial, park, and open space uses. Community Mixed Use areas organize uses into a cohesive district, neighborhood, or corridor, connecting uses in common structures and with sidewalks and trails, and using density, structured parking, shared parking, and other approaches to create green space and public places within the areas. The mix of land uses may include Mediumand High-Density Residential, Office. Community Business. Institutional, and Parks and Open Space uses. Residential land uses generally should represent between 25% and 50% of the overall mixed use area. The mix of uses may be in a common site, development area, or building. Individual developments may consist of a mix of two or more complementary uses that are compatible and connected to surrounding land-use patterns. To ensure that the desired mix of uses and connections are achieved, a more detailed small-area plan, master plan, and/or area-specific design principles is required to guide individual developments within the overall mixed-use area.

Regional Business (RB)

Regional Business uses are commercial areas with include a collection of businesses and **Institutional uses** that provide goods and services to a regional market area. Uses found in Regional Business areas include regional-scale institutions and malls, shopping centers of various sizes, freestanding large-format freestanding stores. smaller multistory office businesses, buildings, and groupings of automobile dealerships. Regional Business areas are located in places with visibility and access from the regional highway system (Interstate 35W State and Highway 36).

Community Business (CB)

Community Business uses are commercial areas are oriented toward businesses and **Institutional uses** involved with the sale provision of goods and services to a local market area. Community business areas include shopping centers and freestanding businesses and institutions that promote community orientation and scale. To provide access and traffic, manage community business areas are located on streets designated as A Minor Augmentor or A Minor Reliever in the Transportation Plan. Community Business areas should have a strong orientation to pedestrian and bicycle access to the area and movement within the area. Residential uses, generally with a density greater than 12 units per acre, may be located in Community Business areas only as part of mixed-use buildings with allowable business uses on the ground floor.

Neighborhood Business (NB)

Neighborhood Business uses areas are small-scale business and Institutional areas located on or at the intersection of minor arterial and collector streets. Business uses in these areas may include retail, service, and office. Residential uses may be located in a mixed-use building in these areas. Residential uses should generally have a density between four and 12 units per acre and are subject to the other limitations for this land use. Buildings shall be scaled appropriately to surrounding neighborhood. There should be appropriate buffers and pedestrian connections between Neighborhood Business areas and adjacent residential Neighborhood neighborhoods. **Business** should areas connected to surrounding neighborhoods by sidewalks or trails.

Item Description: 2030 Comprehensive Plan Implementation—Review of Master Plans

BACKGROUND

The 2030 Comprehensive Plan identities strategies to implement its goals and policies and one of

- these strategies is to "establish a plan to identify pre-2009 master plans" (Chapter 11, page 11-4).
- In the previous Comprehensive Plan, which had been most recently adopted on January 26,
- 5 2004, the City adopted many plans, studies, and supplemental information into the
- 6 Comprehensive Plan as part of a volume of appendices. During the 2008 updating process, the
- 7 Comprehensive Plan Update Steering Committee decided to eliminate all of the appended
- 8 documents, including master plans. Of all of these documents, master plans were the only
- category of document that the committee had difficulty in reaching consensus.
- The Comprehensive Plan established a policy that defined a master plan, identified how future
- (post-2009) master plans would be addressed in the Comprehensive Plan, determined that the
- 12 City Council would review pre-2009 plans and determine if and how these plans would be
- addressed in the Comprehensive Plan, and confirmed that pre-2009 master plans are not
- addressed in the Comprehensive Plan without further City Council action. See Attachment A to
- review the policy.
- Staff has identified seven pre-2009 plans that have been considered master plans in the past to
- determine, if under the Master Plan Policy, they meet the standards of a master plan and, if so,
- determine if they have been adequately addressed in the Comprehensive Plan. The master plans

- Tower Place Area Business Park Plan

- In its review of these plans, staff examined whether each of the plans meet the definition of a master plan provided in the Comprehensive Plan. In order to be considered a master plan, a

- document must contain a general land-use plan for the study area, the study needed to identify a
- specific geographic area, and finally, the study could not be project specific. Based on these
- criteria, only three of the seven identified plans could be considered master plans, including
- Tower Place Area Business Park Plan, Twin Lakes Business Park Master Plan, and Arona-
- Hamline Neighborhood Master Plan. The James Addition Neighborhood Master Plan, the
- Cornerstone Neighborhood Mixed Use Project, and McCarron's Neighborhood Master Plan did
- not contain a general land-use plan for the area studied and the Roseville City Center Master
- Plan and Development Strategy was a project-specific plan.
- Next, staff identified if there had been any changes in land use in the areas guided by the plans.
- For those plans meeting the definition of a master plan, staff reviewed the plan against the 2030
- Comprehensive Plan to determine if the plan had been addressed in either or both the Future
- Land Use Map or within the appropriate Planning District. Finally staff made a recommendation
- if the master plan was adequately addressed in the Comprehensive Plan and any additional

Master Plans

For the purpose of the policies described here, the term "master plan" refers to general land-use plans prepared and adopted by the City for specific geographic areas as the result of City-initiated study or analysis, and does not include project-specific redevelopment detail plans.

It is the policy of the City that all master plans, once adopted, shall also be addressed in the Comprehensive Plan. The master plans shall be addressed by one or more of the following means, as appropriate:

- 1. Including references to the master plan as a tool for use in implementing various aspects of the Comprehensive Plan;
- 2. Updating the content of the land-use plan and other elements of the Comprehensive Plan to correspond to the master plan; and/or
- 3. Adopting into the Comprehensive Plan as a specific element of the Land Use Chapter, and separate and distinct from the master plan document itself, those policies, design guidelines, and other elements of the master plan that are identified in the master plan for such inclusion to promote its implementation.

For master plans adopted before 2009, the City Council shall review each plan and determine whether each one should be addressed in the Comprehensive Plan, and if so, how it will be addressed in the Comprehensive Plan pursuant to this policy.

This policy does not limit the City Council's ability to amend the Comprehensive Plan to address and/or incorporate other plans, policies or guidelines.

The City will require that the all future master plans include a description of how they will be addressed in the Comprehensive Plan.

Master plans adopted prior to 2009 are not addressed in the Comprehensive Plan without further action of the City Council.

Capital Improvements Plan

State Law requires that the implementation program for the Comprehensive Plan contain a capital improvement program for transportation, sewers, parks, water supply, and open space facilities. Each relevant chapter of the Comprehensive Plan contains a section on future capital improvements. The Comprehensive Plan serves as the foundation for ongoing capital-improvements planning by the City.

The City has created a capital-improvements plan (CIP) that matches the estimated project costs over a ten-year period with funding sources. The CIP allows the City to prioritize projects and to make best use of available revenues. By looking at future needs, the City is better able to find funding sources to fill gaps and to coordinate projects with other jurisdictions. The CIP is updated and approved annually. See Appendix A for Roseville's 2009-2018 CIP.

The Comprehensive Plan guides capital improvements by all political subdivisions. According to State Law (M.S. Section 462.356, Subd. 2), no capital improvements shall be authorized by the City (and its subordinate units) or any other political subdivision having jurisdiction within Roseville until the Planning Commission has reviewed the CIP and reported in writing to the City Council as to its compliance of

with the Comprehensive Plan. The City Council may, by resolution adopted by two-thirds vote, dispense with this requirement when it finds that the proposed capital improvement has no relationship to the Comprehensive Plan.

Housing

The Comprehensive Plan must include a housing implementation program, including official controls which will provide sufficient existing and new housing to meet the local unit's share of the metropolitan area need for low- and moderate-income housing. The City will continue to work with the Metropolitan Council to determine Roseville's fair share of the region's new affordable housing for the years 2011-2020. The City and its Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HRA) will continue to monitor Roseville's housing supply, identify needs for public action, and design programs to meet these needs.

Other Implementation Tools

Other Policy Plans

The Comprehensive Plan refers to other policy plans that Roseville uses to guide municipal systems, actions and investments. These plans cover municipal systems for transportation, sanitary sewer, water supply, surfacewater management, and parks. These plans serve as ongoing tools for implementing the plans, goals, and policies in the Comprehensive Plan. These plans may be updated and modified without updating the Comprehensive Plan.
